OVA – A friend in every town

I wanted to regale you with a tale that makes me smile.

I was at QV from 1989 to 1996. In this time I experienced many highs and lows. The lows include the death of Ben Phillip, the whole "bullying" scandal and the Dunblane massacre. On the high side I played for the 1st XV, I was in the colour party (that still makes my mum cry with pride), I experienced a Royal Visit and I had the honour of sharing my childhood with some of the most special people I have ever met.

Now many years later, happily married with 2 sons and a very fat cat, I still speak with pride as I bore my family, friends and work colleagues with tales of my time at QV. This where I get to my point. As many of you probably did, I recently attend a works Christmas night out.

I was disappointed that I was the only member of my team to attend, no worries though, there were many people for other teams and departments I know very well so I was made welcome and had a great time. After the meal several of us found a large table and made ourselves comfortable, we drank, joked and watched a surprisingly good band perform a Scottish themed routine.

As the evening wore on, due to the heat or drink or both one of our band of revellers, John Tovey rolled his shirt sleeves up. With out thinking I said "shirt sleeve order John". He laughed and asked if I had served in the forces. I regrettably had to reply no (an annoying burden of epilepsy kept me out) but explained I had attended Queen Victoria in Dunblane. With a wide smile he replied "good god so did I". I must explain that although John and I have worked together at the same company for 10 years we were more aquaintences than friends.

We spent the remainder of the night and a sizeable chunk of the early hours ignoring our work colleagues and sharing tales of our QV lives. John had left QV in the late 60's (69 I think, I forget the exact year - drink was involved), but what surprised us both is that while there were obvious differences between the QV I attend and the one he attended, the similarities were striking.

We spoke of the Central & Mess halls, 2s ups, home sickness, rookies, of pipes & drums and Grand days. We found our attitudes to life are almost identical, We are both very much family man, fiercely proud and protective of our friends and happiest most when surrounded by those family and friends. Many people ask if I felt isolated at boarding school or comment that I had not experienced real life as other have. Both John and I found that the close knit life in QV shaped us into proud and confident man, always willing to help another. We see the people with whom we shared our years at QV as more than just friends, almost family. I can not say I see or speak to my classmates with any great regularity but hardly a day goes by that I don't remember something of QV. Although there were nearly 20 years between our times at QV we both experienced the teachings of Mr "TAFF" Williams, a man who scared the life out of us a school but who, on

reflection we both hold great respect for. Evidence that what we may have disliked as children was for our own benefit as men.

After my wife Claire had been to her 1st OVA weekend with me she asked in our Children would be able to attend QV. I explained that school was for sons and daughters of service men and women. Her reply still makes me blush with pride. She said "pity - you are nicest and most decent man I know, I want our children to be like you". Think about it. How many times have you held a door open for someone, given up your seat on a bus or stopped to help a complete stranger in need whilst other walk by?.

So my point is simple.

Be proud of who you are and the school you attended. Never be afraid to tell people you are a QV boy or girl. You never know when some one down your local pub, that guy you work with or a neighbour you only occasionally say hello to may, in fact be a brother or sister OLD VICTORIAN.
